




Family Chaoboridae Key to British species

adapted from Freeman (1950) by Mike Hackston

1 First segment of the tarsus short, about a quarter of the length of the strongly lengthened second segment; claws with two teeth, a basal short one and a very long one placed centrally. Genus *Mochlonyx*.



First segment of the tarsus elongate, nearly or quite twice as long as second segment; claws small, simple. Genus *Chaoborus*.3

2	relatively thicker, largely pale but with the femora usually conspicuously dark towards the tip. Thorax relatively paler, not appearing striped when viewed from the front. Male hypopygium shorter. Larger species, wing length 4.5-5 mm.
	Common in woods in spring. Termed <i>M culiciformis</i> DeGeer, 1776 in Freeman (1950).
	All segments of the tarsus with dark hair right to the base. Legs relatively
	thinner, the femora uniform in colour, not darkened towards the tip. Thorax
	relatively darker, appearing indistinctly striped when viewed from the front.
	Male hypopygium longer. Smaller species, wing length 3.5-4 mm
	<i>Mochlonyx fuliginosus</i> Felt
	Yorkshire, Cumbria, Kerry, Termed <i>M martinii</i> Edwards, 1930 in Freeman (1950).
	TURSHIE, CUIDHA, NETV. TEHIEU WHAILIH LUWAIUS, 1330 III FIEEHIAH (1330).


3 Femora and tibiae with many dark rings. Pulvilli absent. Vein Cu₁ with a hairy extension near the tip parallel to the hind margin. Wing length 3.5-4.5 mm. Subgenus Peusomyia.




........... Chaoborus (Peusomyia) pallidus Fabricius

Yorkshire, Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire, Hertfordshire, Middlesex, Shropshire, Hampshire.

Legs unbanded. Pulvilli present. Vein Cu₁ running straight to the hind margin of the wing. Subgenus Chaoborus.4



4 Abdomen uniformly dark, unbanded. Posterior pronotum blackish on upper half, yellowish on lower half. Femora always uniform in colour, not darkened towards the tip. Last segment of male antenna twothirds the length of the second to last. Wing length 3.5-5 mm.



...... Chaoborus (Chaoborus) crystallinus Common and generally distributed.

Abdomen banded on at least some of the segments. If pronotum dark on upper half then the femora are dark towards the tip.5

5	Posterior pronotum as in <i>crystallinus</i> . Femora blackish towards the tip. Male antennae as <i>crystallinus</i> . Wing length 4.5-5 mm.
	Chaoborus (Chaoborus) obscuripes Van der Wulp
	Buckinghamshire, Glamorgan. Scotland. Very rarely collected.
	Posterior pronotum either entirely pale or indistinctly brown or darker on lower
	half. Femora uniform in colour. Last segment of male antenna as long as the
	second to last. Wing length 3.5-4.5 mm.
	Common and generally distributed. Most of the pale specimens will be found to belong here.
